FAQs about studying abroad

Q: Will I be able to go for a summer programme?

A: Yes, but bear in mind that sometimes host universities do not accurately list the prerequisites for their courses. As such, you may think that they would allow you to take Module X, but in reality, they may not. Consult the Programme Coordinator; he or she will be able to tell you which courses typically require what prerequisites.

Q: What are the typical prerequisites for electives offered in other universities?

A: Below is a list of typical prerequisites of a selected number of electives courses in psychology. Universities sometimes have additional prerequisites, or are willing to waive prerequisites; in addition, prerequisites sometimes differ between summer terms and regular semesters. SRM I and II would be useful courses to take before going abroad, even if these two courses may not be explicitly stated as prerequisites. If in doubt, check with the host university.

Q: Will I be able to go for a semester abroad programme?

A: Yes. But bear in mind that you need to take SRM I (or equivalent) in monsoon and SRM II (or equivalent) in spring, whichever university you are going. If you fail to take those courses, your graduation will be delayed by a full year. In addition, it is important that you clear your Core Domains early on, whichever university you are going. Furthermore, many electives offered in other universities will require Core Domain courses and/or SRM I/II (or equivalent).

Q: How many credits would be transferred for each course?

A: Ashoka University matches the number of transfer credits with the number of contact hours, subjected to OAA's regulations for the maximum number of credits allowed to be transferred throughout a student's candidature. A typical course at Ashoka is 4 credits (13 weeks x 3 hrs = 39 contact hours). Hence if the course you are taking at University X is 30 contact hours, only 3 credits will be transferred.

Q: What should I do if only 3 credits are transferred?

A: You are 1 credit short. All psychology courses are 4-credit courses. You should take another 4-credit course to make up for the shortfall.

Q: Will I be guaranteed that I will be allowed to take certain courses by my host university?

A: Talk to their International Office. Bear in mind that they have to prioritise their own undergraduates before they consider your choices.

Q: Ashoka is a partner university of University X that I have chosen. Surely I will have priority, right?

A: If University X is reputable, it probably has p number of partner universities, who may each send q number of students to University X. Hence the total number of students trying to take a particular course is pq. It is unlikely that Ashoka has special priority over these p number of partner universities.

Q: Should I take only psychology courses abroad?

A: In principle, you can take non-psychology courses abroad and apply for these courses to be transferred. Courses in anthropology, sociology, management, marketing, math, etc., often provides fringe benefits towards your understanding of psychology. However, the Psychology Dept cannot decide on whether these non-psychology courses are transferrable or not. To transfer credits attained from these courses, seek out the relevant departments.

Q: Should I apply to universities that have strong affiliations to a particular religious faith?

A: If you do not relate to that particular religion, consider whether you will be comfortable in that university where religious values are likely to intermixed with educational content. Furthermore, you may be uncomfortable with some practices (e.g., starting each class with a prayer) if you do not relate to that particular religion.

Q: What kind of courses should I take?

A: If you have completed your Core Domains, take courses that broaden your horizons, especially those that Ashoka does not offer, and/or courses that align with your long-term goals. For example, if you are interested in being a stand-up comedian, take *Psychology of Humor*.

Q: Will I lose out if I don't go abroad?

A: No.

Q: Will I gain anything if I do go abroad?

A: It depends. Students who go abroad with a "tourist" mindset often don't benefit much academically; students who go abroad with a "learning" mindset often benefit from their experiences.
